### Key points and discussion (Anne)

### The new National Framework, and learnings from the consultation with children, young people and families

Need to find ways to work together to help governments shift	
their investment upstream - in order to 'turn the curve'	

Children, young people and families reported that the services that helped most:

• came from similar backgrounds as themselves - e.g. culturally - where they felt respected, listened to and not judged

### • could meet their multiple and complex needs (on site and/or through supported links)

Children and young people often do not feel safe, welcome, respected, listened to in schools



Lack of coordination amongst services was a barrier for families - e.g. inadequate public transport; difficulty getting timely crisis support and/or prevention support Young people at Don Dale say they need skills to get a job

> Adult services also need to focus on the needs of children

> > We need to scale up those that are working

NTPA could offer an avenue to codesign solutions to wicked problems

Linkages to other 'frameworks' (e.g. Aboriginal Justice Agreement, Justice Reform Initiative)

There are many positive activities in NT schools and communities

### Key points and discussion (Helen)

### How do we frame social issues around prevention?

How we talk about issues matters (e.g. poverty, government, youth justice, young people)

> Talking about the 'evidence base' does not work (e.g. re shifting 'tough on crime' views and approaches)

We need to communicate better with the public and the parts of government, business and non-government sectors that we want to influence

> Dilemma for police in how to issue information to the public

Social media plays a big role in public engagement (e.q. can vilify young people)

We need to:



• invite social media into the discussion, given their roles as influencers (both positive and negative) review 'Guidelines for the treatment of children and young people in the media' to identify gaps, include social media, break into manageable messages • develop messaging guidelines/storyline/cheat sheets to help us when talking about social issues share positive stories of resilience

National Child Protection Week is 4-10 September 2022 with the theme: Every Child in Every Community Needs a Fair Go

### Children's Week

is 22-31 October 2022 with the theme:

Children have the right to a standard of living that is good enough to meet their physical and mental needs. The government should help families who cannot afford to provide this (simplified version, UNICEF Australia)
